HIV Testing: It Helps to Know

This program is presented by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. CDC – safer, healthier people.

In the U.S., approximately one million people are living with HIV. Of those, nearly a quarter don't know they're infected. When people find out they are infected, they can benefit from earlier access to live-saving treatment, and reduce the risk of infecting others. Because anyone can get HIV, CDC recommends people 13 to 64 be tested at their doctor's office or any health care facility.
