Impact of Requiring Influenza Vaccination of Children Attending Licensed Childcare or Preschool Programs — Connecticut, 2012–13 Influenza Season

In the U.S., many young children go to day-care centers and preschools; these environments put them at higher risk for influenza. Children under five can have serious complications from the flu, including hospitalization and even death.

While an annual flu vaccine is recommended for *all* children six months and older, fewer than 70 percent get vaccinated each year. An annual influenza vaccination is the *most* effective way to avoid this potentially dangerous illness. It's safe and kids should get it each year, as soon as it's available. Talk to your child's health provider about getting a flu vaccine.
